
Daniel E. Rak (Israel) 2nd year student in International Security Intern Analyst Eurasia Group – NYC, USA



What are your role and main responsibilities?

My work with EG encompasses a horizontal, qualitative geopolitical analysis approach concentrating on global strategic sectors and financial & professional services. Be active in your career building, do not compromise and stay optimistic. **Stay focused on your goal** and do not let any personal, environmental, or political situation affect your confidence in your ability to get where you want to be and do what you want to do. A crisis is also an opportunity!
